Human Trafficking Programs and Services

Through the **Hope Found Project** we provide crisis, intervention and stabilization. These are called 'new clients' in our reports. **Path Found** is our second-stage programming that helps survivors regain their selfdirection and autonomy. These are 'ongoing' clients who are active in programming.

During the fiscal year, we had a increase of **55.8%** in the number of people we supported through these programs. Many are youth between the ages of 15 - 21.

The Hope Found project supported 40 new clients and 27 from the previous fiscal year for a total of **67** this year.


Strength Found had a total of **24** clients actively participating in programs.

Training and Education

In 2021, we embarked on a two year journey to develop a peer support training program that would:

- vicarious trauma and burnout.
- adhere to ethical standards of practice.
- and childhood sexual abuse.
- the role.

We launched Ethical Peer Support at the end of February and our preliminary evaluation showed that we were on the right track with the average overall rating of 8.5 out of 10.

Our evaluation showed some areas for improvement and we are grateful to the first cohort for their honest and thoughtful evaluation.

I wanted to say thank you so much for the outing on Thursday. Not only was I taken out of my comfort zone in an amazing way, but I **feel way more confident** just from an hour of kickboxing. I feel just a bit safer living in my building knowing I could become a little boxer. I hope we can do it again, as it is hard sometimes just to get out of the house.. **It was very motivational** and **pushed me to socialize, which is something I really need**. The girls I met the last two times with you, were also fabulous. Thank you again for this opportunity and I hope this could be a regular thing once a week or 2-3 times a month!! It would be ideal. **I am tearing up typing this because the last couple of years have been hell, and doing something so small like learning self defence really brings joy to my heart.** "I want to say that I'm so grateful to have found your support group. I knew that I needed to face some of the harsh realities that childhood sexual abuse (CSA) had caused me. I had a lot of emotional pain and grief but I didn't know how to get on the road to healing. I had spoken with my doctor about my CSA and she had told me to look into getting support from the distress centre. I was very lucky cause I called and was told about this program that was designed for people that had been through CSA. I was then led to Voice found which led me to Strength found. This program, and the staff that work there, have helped me in so many ways. It was tough to face some of the anxiety and insecurities that were caused by CSA but with the support I received, I'm now able to identify my triggers and have a better tool kit to deal with them. 

Message from Board Chair

That's what Voice Found is all about. Helping those with lived experience of sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, or human trafficking, is at the core of everything we do. Our services don't fit in neat tidy boxes, because the trauma experienced by our clients is not neat and tidy. Each and every person has their own unique needs, and we strive everyday to help them on this journey and help them find their voice with Voice Found.

My personal journey included being sexually abused when I was a child and then being exploited in my later years. This is why I have devoted myself to this organization and hope to continue to do so for many years to come. As with many organizations, funding can be challenging, but each one of you who is taking the time to read this report has a reason for being here. Something has drawn you to this organization and everything we are trying to do. You may be a victim yourself and you likely know someone impacted. One day, I hope there is no need for an organization like this, but until that time, I ask you to help us continue this most important work. I am so very proud of the work we do and know we can do so much more.

This year the staff at Voice Found has been doing amazing work. The Clinic offers trauma informed care to clients and is providing training to countless health care professionals so they too can provide trauma informed care to patients. Imagine having been a victim and going to see a doctor who doesn't understand the anxiety or trauma of simply being touched during a normal exam. Our anti-human trafficking team has been working relentlessly helping victims of human trafficking escape their traffickers by first getting them to safety, and then helping with their many needs through the Hope Found Project. But the Voice Found staff don't stop there. They continue the support with our Path Found project in helping our clients move into the next phase of their life and regain their independence. Additionally, our staff offers training to front line staff in social work across the country, police services and students. Voice Found is providing a voice for those who cannot speak for themselves, educating workers and providing the education to prevent young people from falling victim to traffickers.

Our peer support team has been working with survivors of sexual abuse through the Strength Found. The stories from participants in the 15-week program are heart-warming and the growth seen is humbling as our clients work through their trauma and begin the journey of healing. I have had the privilege of participating in one of the programs and can personally say that this is exceptional. Additionally, the Ethical Peer Support Training program was launched and has been met with high praise. I will be hanging up my hat as chair this year and passing the baton but will continue to serve this organization with pride. Developing the Ethical Peer Support program is a big step forward and there is more to come.

Support from the community is so welcomed and this year people in Ottawa came through in many ways. February 22nd is Human Trafficking Awareness Day, and this year we saw support from the Mayor, the Shaw Centre, and Ottawa Tourism. We are grateful for their efforts.
